

Ardrossan is a town on the North Ayrshire coast in southwestern Scotland SW of Glasgow north of Troon and Ayr, where River Clyde from Glasgow reaches the sea Firth of Clyde.

Mentioned by Robertson E.10, where you can see an old ship letter –too old to be on an Icelandic mail!

In "Scottish Twin-arc Postmarks with stampers' Numbers" by Mackay the has shown thee versions of the same stamp – stampers # 1. (Mackay's # 759, 760 and 761). # 759 was delivered 16.11.1906, renovated (# 760) 29.05.1911 and totally renewed (# 761) from 26.01.1915.

Pór Porsteins has compiled the list of sailings paid for caring mail from Iceland, and that is the basis for the registration – but other dates can appear, but then there is no amount registered for carrying the mail.

The following is a picture of "an old friend": SS OCEANA $(2)^3$.



Oceana is a part of the story of Queenstown⁴ – and here a part of the story of Ardrossan – but she did not go to Queenstown and not to Ardreossan. She took two summercruise from 1906 until 1910 (only one in 1908).



OCEANA was on cruse. She went to Iceland and Spitsberg so that stamp from there must have been awailable on board⁵.

³ Hamburg America Line steamship built 1890 at Dumbarton by William Denny & Co. for the Union Line. Launched as the "Scot" for their Southampton - Madeira - Cape Town service. Rebuilt and lengthened 1896. Used as a Boer War troopship 1899. Purchased by HAPAG 1904 to be used for cruising and renamed Oceana.

And going back she arived in Reykjavik 11th of July 1909 and SS MODESTA took over carying the mail from the passengers via Adrossan. Quite a lot of mail was send July 11

A copy has also found its way to Iceland Philatelic Magazine Issue 3 page 8: "Ardrossan – An unusual transit mark" *Ole Svinth*.




Ole Svinth: "Ardrossan is rather uncommon as a transit mark on mail from Iceland. The postcard is over franked by 3 aur as the postcard rate was 10 aur. The Ardrossan postmark 1909 July 20th is very nice and clean on this card which was seen on the internet. The price 400 USD looks a little too high to find a customer. The card was cancelled Reykjavik 1909July 11th. A 9 days journey seems to be quite long."

⁶ MODESTA left 14th so the trip was only 6 days.

⁷ Probably the one built in 1895 as the British cargo ship LESTRIS by Wigham Richardson, England for the Cork S.S.Co Ltd, Cork. In 1904 she was bought by Argo Dampfschifffahrts Gesellschaft - Richard Adler & Söhne and renamed **CONDOR**. In 1913 she sold and renamed EUGINIE.

Type 759

Again: "Oceana, a passenger ship from the Hamburg-America line arrived here last night with 270 passengers. They have fun here today and look around. Racing at Melun at 4 -5. The ship leaves north by land to Spitzbergen. Passengers mostly German and American."

The passenger did also that time sent quit a lot of mail:

Heinrich Schilling also show a copy cancelled MR 3 1913 and also send to Herrn Julius Seemann. As there are many with the name it has not been possible to identify the recipient. As the correspondence apparently stop in 1913 it might be the Julius Seemann born June 30, 1890 in Frankfurt, Hesse, Germany, who died October 9, 1914. Killed in WW1. I have not seen the text on the cards.



There are probably more examples – please respond with your supplements. – and I got the name of the sender – but who is he?
