

# ISLANDSToutakt

SPECIAL # 6 2018 v.3 - ARDROSSAN

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**Ardrossan** is a town on the North Ayrshire coast in southwestern Scotland SW of Glasgow north of Troon and Air, where River Clyde from Glasgow reach the see Firth of Clyde).

Mentioned by Robertson E.10, where you can see and old ship letter –too old to be on an Icelandic mail!

I "Scottish Twin-arc Postmarks with stampers' Numbers" by Mackay there are shown tree versions of the same stamp – stampers # 1. (Mackay's # 759, 760 and 761). # 759 was delivered 16.11.1906, renovated (# 760) 29.05.1911 and totally renewed (# 761) from 26.01.1915.

Pór Porsteins has compiled the list of sailings paid for caring mail from Iceland, and that is the basis for the registration – but other dates can appear, but then there are no amount registered for caring the mail.

There is some unused space if you print, but to clarify each transport they are separated.

A copy has also found its way to Iceland Philatelic Magazine Issue 3: "Ardrossan – An unusual transit mark" *Ole Svinth* 





Ardrossan is rather uncommon as a transit mark on mail from Iceland. The postcard is over franked by 3 aur as the postcard rate was 10 aur. The Ardrossan postmark July 20th 1909 is very nice and clean on this card which was seen on the internet. The price 400 USD looks a little too high to find a customer. The card was cancelled Reykjavik July 11th 1909. A 9 days journey seems to be quite long. Yet to be seen is a letter cancelled at Ardrossan as the first treatment by postal authorities. Hitherto only known as a transit mark."

The copy is from eBay – and on the back of the card is and old friend: OCEANA.



Oceana is a part of the story of Queenstown – and now a part of the storry of Adrossan – but she did not go to Queenstown and not to Adreossan. She took two summercruise from 1906 until 1910 (only one in 1908). She went to Spitsberg so that stamp must have been awalabel on bortd<sup>1</sup>.

And going back – the mail is all adressed to germany – and that gives sense.

She arived in Reykjavik 11th of July 1908 and Modesta took over carring the mail from the passengers.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup>Probably the one built in 1895 as the British cargo ship LESTRIS by Wigham Richardson, England for the Cork S.S.Co Ltd, Cork. In 1904 she was bought by Argo Dampfschifffahrts Gesellschaft - Richard Adler & Söhne and renamed CONDOR. In 1913 she sold and renamed EUGINIE.



Heinreich Schilling also show a copy cancelled MR 3 1913 and send to Herrn Julius Seemann. It might be the Julius Seemann born June 30, 1890 in Frankfurt, Hesse, Germany, who died October 9, 1914. Killed in WW1. I have not seen the text on the cards, so the sender is unknown.
