

# **Blyth Ship Letter**

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#### **SPECIAL** # 10 - 2025 V4¹ - BLYTH

This is a part of a series published which summarizes, supplemented by recent discoveries, information published over the years in IslandsKontakt and elsewhere. We must all be grateful for the sustained efforts of all those who, over the years, as Editors<sup>2</sup> or Authors have contributed to the gathering and dissemination of information relevant to the philately of Iceland.



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Blyth is at the river Blyth 15 miles north of Newcastle Upon-Tyne on the east coast of England. Just south of the Scottish/English border.

1. Robertson (E.19) mention a round ship letter cancel (E.18/B s.2) and show the proof from the dispatch-book entry 17th November 1880, but his remark is "Use at present unrecorded".

Robertson (s.1) indicate the use 1903 to 1913 but Hoskin (9D³) and Mike Dovey & Keith Morris <sup>4</sup> indicate: "The Two Line Cancel: SHIP LETTER / BLYTH NORTH HD - 2 line cancellation from 1903 and, although it was rarely used, it lasted until 1920"<sup>5</sup>. Shilling indicate a use from 1901 until 1933. Mike Tuttle indicate 1903 until 1926 with an addition, that a part of the cancel is known at 25 aur airmail stamp from 1934<sup>6</sup>.

The "ordinary recorded use" must be between 1903 and 1922 (perhaps 1926) – but there can be later use.

3. "NORTHUMPERLAND" (NH)



I cannot find any ship going from Iceland on 2 April or before the next ship "SKALD". SS SKALD came to Reykjavik 7 April: "Gufuskipið Skald kom hingað frá Englandi A fimtudag með timbur og kol til B. Guðmundssonar"<sup>11</sup>. The departure is not mentioned.

## Grosser Kurfürst 1910



The Norddeutschen Lloyd passenger ship Grosser Kurfürst was in Reykjavik from the 3ed to the 7the July 1910.

The passengers were sending quite a lot of mail:

It is specified in Þjóðólfur from 08. July 1910:

"The British tourists on the Grosser Kurfiirst. They left here 195 letters and 4396 postcards. — They were to these countries: To the United States 494, Germany 2768, Austria and Hungary 463, Switzerland 152, France 122, the Netherlands 107, Italy 103, England 50, Russia 46, Finland 33, Portugal 17, Malta 16 and various other countries 125."

#### Notre-Dame de la Mer<sup>18</sup> 1911 – 1914

**Notre-Dame de la Mer**: In 1910 a number of shipowners donated a large steam trawler (ex Occident) to Les Œuvres de Mer. It was converted into a modern hospital ship and would increasingly take over the tasks of its aging predecessor. In 1914 it was incorporated by the French navy as a military hospital ship. After the war, the ship was sold in 1920 because the organization had insufficient funds to make it fully operational again. The ship was operating in the waters around Island.

Letter issued at the hospital ship Notre-Dame de la Mer, prepaid with (invalid) French seal, Icelandic T-stamp placed in Reykjavik on 4.5.1912. By boat to BLYTH (North East England), on arrival line stamp Ship Letter Blyth Northumberland 14.5.1912, to France 18.5.1912. Valued at 50 cents, double the missing letter postage of 25 cents.
